

And not just shepherds—the hunters who'd tried to catch the creature were being killed, too, killed and dragged through the snow and devoured. There was a bounty, apparently. A decent price. That's all the twins heard.

Dusk is the story of Iris and Floyd and the puma that they initially collect a bounty on. Brought up as nomads by parents who were outlaws on the run, roaming the land and stealing from farms, they have been unable to shake off the stigma that their surname carries. Now as adults living as off their wits, and getting work where and when they can, they continue to be codependent. Floyd, constantly in pain from a crippling back injury, which slows him on his horse as he rides through the harsh beauty of Tasmania's highlands, is supported by his twin sister, who must massage him at night to keep him mobile and coax him down from his thoughts of ending his own life. Unarmed, but with no other prospects in sight, they decide to go collect the bounty and set out after the puma.

With touches of *Butcher's Crossing* and *The Son, Dusk* is a powerful and atmospheric historical novel exploring the cruelty and small kindnesses between people and celebrates the remote wildness of the Tasmanian landscape.





Saint-Auch, a small town on the outskirts of Toulouse, in the early 1990s. Between the Genêts housing estate and the Acacias residences, where modest families live, a gang of teenagers is growing up. They are bored, roam around on mopeds, are passionate about horror films and wait for the end of secondary school, preparing themselves for the same disappointments their parents encountered. All of them endure the cruelty of the group, confronting the emotions of desire, social injustice and the tragedies that have already marked their young lives.

In the housing estate, at the end of the impasse des Ormes, there's a house they've always known to be abandoned, about which disturbing stories circulate and which exerts a strange power of attraction over them. 



This first novel from Abdulrazak Gurnah since being awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature in 2021, is a beautifully written, terribly moving and powerful tale of how honesty, application and determination can triumph over all adversities.

When Karim is three his mother Raya leaves her arranged marriage and goes back to live with her parents. A decade later when Karim is a teenager his mother remarries to Haji, a pharmacist. She goes to live with her new husband in Dar Es Salaam and Karim goes to live with his much elder brother Ali and his wife Jalula. A bond develops between Ali and Karim although physically they are very different. Ali is not academic but Karim thrives in his studies and gains a scholarship to Dar Es Salaam University. He meets Fauzia and falls in love with her. But when she has a child with him the strains in the marriage begin to show.

Badar is a young shy boy who is forced out of school when his father's business collapses. He goes to live with his uncle Haji's family as their servant. He works hard and grows up to find a job in a hotel. He gets to know Karim and his wife Fauzia and their newborn. Their baby seems to have colic and finds it difficult to settle. Only Badar has a magical gift of putting the baby at ease.

Karim's head is turned by a beautiful oversees visitor and this destroys his marriage. Fauzia is heartbroken but realises slowly that there is one person whose dependability, strength and love are indisputable.

A bdulrazak Gurnah is the 2021 winner of the Nobel Prize in Literature. He is the author of nine previous novels, including *Paradise* (shortlisted for the Booker Prize), *By the Sea* (longlisted for the Booker Prize and a finalist for the Los Angeles Times Book Prize), and *Desertion*. Born and raised in Zanzibar, he is Professor Emeritus of English and Postcolonial Literatures at the University of Kent



The new novel by Chris Kraus, which abandons her own world of high culture to experience and articulate the consciousness of underclass life in America.

On the Iron Range of northern Minnesota in January 2019, three teenagers – a girl and two boys – kidnapped an older acquaintance and shot him at close range in the woods. The three were arrested within hours after using the victim's card to buy energy drinks at the gas station.

Catt Greene – (Kraus' avatar, introduced in her 2012 novel Summer of *Hate*) – and her then-partner Paul Garcia were living close by in a picturesque cabin in Balsam they'd bought in 2013 as a summer escape from LA. At the time of the crime, the cabin had become their full-time escape-hatch. After losing his job during an alcoholic relapse, Paul – an addiction therapist - retreated to Balsam with Catt to get sober and begin working with kids in Juvenile Detention.

When news of the "Mesabi Trail Murder" appeared in the local newspapers, Catt became obsessed with the case and soon discovered that it was just one of a string of methamphetamine-related murders involving young people on the Iron Range, a traditionally Democratic former mining community that flipped dramatically for Trump in 2016. Catt spoke with the kids, their friends and their families and struggled to find aspects of their inner lives. But found them blunted by generational addiction and trauma.

Written as three linked short novels, *The Four Spent the Day Together* is a modest epic of American working-class culture spanning seventy-five years and several generations, exposing the events that led to the three kids to this crime without exonerating them.

hris Kraus is a writer and critic. Her novels include Aliens & Anorexia, I Love Dick, Torpor and Summer of Hate and she has published three books of cultural criticism. I Love Dick was adapted for television. A former Guggenheim Fellow, Kraus held the Mary Routt Chair of Writing at Scripps College in 2019 and was Writer-in-Residence at ArtCenter College until 2024. She has written for various magazines and has been a co-editor of the independent press Semiotext(e) since 1990.

On remote Tuga de Oro, Charlotte Walker's caseload of pregnant cows and ailing lizards has only increased. She's still digesting shocking news about her father's identity – in fact, she probably should feel considerably worse than she does. But somehow, between the long days on small family farms and long nights with Levi Mendoza, she's content to remain, just for the moment, in blissful retreat from her real life.

But now, as Tuga closes for hurricane season, reality hits the island with the force of a tropical storm: Charlotte's mother arrives. Lucinda Compton-Neville knows an identity crisis when she sees one, and has come to haul her daughter back on course: back to London, back to her career, back to home and reality.

But what if Charlotte isn't ready to face reality? And what does it really mean, to come home?
