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

Jakuta Alikavazovic is a French writer of Bosnian and Montenegrin origins. She was born in Paris and studied at the École Normale Superieure. Her first novel, Corps Volatils won the Goncourt Prize for Best First Novel and her second and third novels, Le Londres-Luxor and La Blonde et Le Bunker won prizes in France and Italy. Her most recent novel, Night as it Falls (L'Avancee de la Nuit), was published by Faber in 2020. Her essay Comme un Ciel en Nous (Like a Sky in Us) won the Prix Medicis Essai 2021 and her collected newspaper columns Faites Un Voeu (Make a Wish) were published in 2022. She is the Sciences Po chair of Creative Writing Autumn 2024-25.



It began, then, two weeks later, on an orange afternoon. Cool but ruminant; a few days before Halloween. Sunny looked up from the terrarium-sized tub of toys that lived in the living room and asked, 'Mama, do you remember when I died?'

This is the story of a young family, Lena, Odhran and their daughter, Sunny.

Lena, an ex-musician, is learning to enjoy motherhood, but in so doing is learning to let go of her past. Odhran is a very functional and loving father. Four-year-old Sunny, it turns out, believes she has lived previous lives, and is able to recount how she died, on the side of a road, near a puddle of water.

This sets in motion an intense period of anxiety and soul-searching as Lena and Odhran try to understand the root of Sunny's experiences - is she suffering from disassociation, a psychological disorder, or has she truly lived in the past? Friends and family try to help, either by dismissing the claims, or by suggesting various causes. Some vaguely believe Sunny, others are incredulous.

As enrapturing as it is unnerving, *Make Strange* asks where we might have been, and who we might become. Darkly funny and bee-sting-sharp, this is a family novel tilted on its axis.





Karin and Alfred are in their final year of high school. On a night Karin is babysitting Alfred's younger siblings, she is sexually assaulted by one of his closest friend. This is the night that brings them closer together, yet from then on their relationship fills with both shock and infatuation as the aftermaths of that night draw them together whilst also pushing them apart. Following both Karin and Alfred's perspectives, the story explores the vulnerability of youth when confronted with the harshest realities of life, heightened by the two's vastly different childhoods as they come of age in a moment of pain.'



Whoever enters this text falls into the abyss of our world and gazes into the darkness with eyes wide open.

The narrator, a renowned writer, is contacted by a famous theatre producer who is keen to involve her in his latest project - a play set in the tropics, the reconstruction of a case as he puts it, a kind of tropical passion with references to Herzog and Coppola. She is to record her personal impressions in detail, documenting the research and creation of the play which revolves around two Dutch women who went missing in the the Latin American jungle in 2014. A digital camera found at the scene highlighted a mystery, containing 91 consecutive photos, without any indication of what the women had been trying to capture.

A few weeks later, she sets off to join the theater group on their journey deep into the jungle. She sense a kind of danger, a discomfort that washes over her in waves, though she is unable to tell whether this comes from the landscape and climate or from the director's plans. The disorientated feeling she gets from being displaced, the deserted roads, abandoned plantations, the silences are all the things that the director has asked her to record and transcribe. The deeper she goes, the more she loses: language, concepts, her own self, her sense of the world.

Dorothee Elmiger tells a disturbing story of humans and monsters, of fear and violence, of being lost in the universe and of the failure of narratives.

orothee Elmiger is a Swiss writer, editor and translator. She is the author of Out of the Sugar Factory, Shift Sleepers and Invitation to the Bold of Heart. Elmiger has been awarded numerous prizes, including the Aspekte Literature Prize for the best debut novel written in German, the 2021 Schillerpreis, and the 2022 Nicolas Born Prize. Out of the Sugar Factory was shortlisted for both the German and the Swiss Book Award. In 2021, she held the Samuel Fisher Visiting Professorship at the Free University in Berlin and in 2023 she was the Max Kade writer in residence at the University of Michigan. She's a member of the German Academy for Language and Literature. She lives in New York.

Light and Thread reveals Han Kang's daily life as a "northfacing person", as she describes putting down the roots of shade-tolerant plants in her north-facing garden, and shifting the orientation of several tabletop mirrors to capture the sunlight. As the black and white pages are turned, the text and images intersect and seep into each other, evoking the light and shadows that permeate the author's room and garden throughout her days and nights. Here, where Han Kang's poetic prose meets 'writing without boundaries', the world we ultimately encounter is filled with the wonders of life, and with dazzling light.

Despite the popularity of Japan's Yakuza in film, literature and popular culture, surprisingly, there has been no good, popular history of Japanese organized crime until now. There is some memoir, one or two academic books, and some popular reportage (Bob Whiting and Jake Adelstein) dealing with Post-War Japanese crime, but nothing bringing original Japanese source material to life, and certainly nothing about the tumultuous periods in late Shogunate and early Meiji eras, including Yakuza involvement in the human trafficking that was the precursor to the wartime comfort women system.

Based largely on original primary research, History of the Yakuza includes material from rare, banned volumes concealed from authorities in private mobster libraries, historical Japanese-language source material hitherto unavailable in English, and extensive interviews with old gangsters, in what is the definitive work on the subject.

Andrew Rankin is an English author and translator who specialises in the cultural history of Japan. He moved to Japan at the age of twenty to train in karate. He lived in Tokyo for nearly two decades before earning a doctorate in Japanese literature from Cambridge University. He currently divides his time between Tokyo and Bali, Indonesia. Andrew is the author of Seppuku, an examination of the samurai death ritual, and Mishima, Aesthetic Terrorist, an intellectual portrait of the novelist and playwright Yukio Mishima. Rankin's translations of Japanese fiction include Nakagami Kenji's Snakelust.

This vital book traces the emergence of modern international environmental law, from the accident at the Chernobyl nuclear power plant, in April 1986, to the adoption of a possible definition of a new international crime of ecocide.

It does so through the author's personal journey, from arguing the first cases on the environment at the World Court, through negotiating the ICC Statute, and drafting a definition of Ecocide, to the litigation of climate change case before the World Cour, with an Advisory Opinion to be handed down in June 2025.

Involved in all of these moments, and able to provide direct experience and tales, Philippe Sands offers a compelling blend of story-telling, legal analysis and environmental advocacy. He argues for the recognition of ecocide as a new international crime, akin to genocide and war crimes, one that offers an opportunity to move the natural world from the margins to the heart of the legal order, and an end to impunity for environmental harms, in times of peace and war.
