In the run up to the 2016 presidential election, Owen Callahan, an aspiring writer, moves back to Kentucky to live with his Trump-supporting uncle and grandfather. Eager to clean up his act after wasting time and potential in his early twenties, he takes a job as a groundskeeper at a small college in the Appalachian foothills, where he's permitted to take a few writing courses. It's here that he meets Alma Hadzic, a Writer-in-Residence, who seems to have everything Owen doesn't – a prestigious position, an Ivy League education, success as a writer. They begin a secret relationship, and as they grow closer, Alma, who comes from a liberal family of Bosnian immigrants, struggles to understand Owen's fraught relationship with his own family and home.

Exploring the boundaries between life and writing and how our upbringings affect the people we become, *Groundskeeping* is a novel about two very different people navigating the entanglements of class and identity and trying to stay together against a turbulent political backdrop.

THE NEW LIFE Tom Crewe

In 1894 John Addington and Henry Ellis decide to write a revolutionary book. They will argue that homosexuality is as innocuous as colour blindness, and that the law - which makes all sexual activity between men a crime - must be changed. Such a book has never been written before, and to publish it will be to wage war on conventional morality. John has been married to Catherine for twenty-five years, and is the father of three daughters, but has spent his life trying to accept and understand his desires for men. He has fallen in love with Frank, a young working-class printer. Henry is married to Edith, who has fallen in love with Angelica, a young woman who wants Edith all for herself. These two marriages, each altered irrevocably by the unanticipated introduction of a third person, are stalked by guilt and shame. They are also shaped and put under pressure by new ideas about sex, social equality, the role of women and the right to deviate from the norm.

When Oscar Wilde is arrested and put on trial for homosexuality in the spring of 1895, John and Henry have to choose whether to publish their book. Faced with the consequences of their choice, they and the people around them are forced to consider another question: what price is worth paying for a new way of living? *The New Life* – very loosely based on the experiences of John Addington Symonds and Havelock Ellis – captures a generation in the process of discovering the nature and limits of personal freedom, struggling to create a better world as the twentieth century comes into view.

Tom Crewe was born in Middlesbrough in 1989. He has a PhD in 19th-century British history from the University of Cambridge. Since 2015, he has been an editor at the *London Review of Books*, to which he has contributed more than thirty essays on politics, art, history and fiction. Two of his essays, accounts of the decline of local government and of the AIDS crisis, have been very widely read and cited. *The New Life* is his first novel.

The Package is a novel about family relations, about ties which – we assume – are inescapable. The female narrator has left her homeland and has exercised her detachment as if it were a muscle that needs to be trained in order to have a life that offers some pleasures. Her plans do not foresee that the thread that connects the narrator back to her origins may suddenly materialise to put in disarray the small madeto-measure world she has built for herself.

Where does a family begin and end? Where in the continuous chain is the starting point? Throughout the novel the concept of filiation is challenged as well as the idea of being part of. The story does not arrive at any conclusion; the ending, rather, leaves us on the edge of a deep crack into which the very few certainties we may have, drop. However, this is a novel that also gives us the excitement of recognising that we are finally at the beginning of a story that is completely new and completely ours.

Elsewhere is a collection of nine beguiling and wonderous stories, both modern and historical, set in Dublin, London, Stockholm and China, always funny and cerebral. Yan Ge's first work written in English will introduce readers to an author at the top of their career; published widely in Chinese and with stories already placed with the likes of *The Stinging Fly, RTE, Brick* and Faber's anthology *Being Various*.

Contemporary stories of isolation, the diasporic experience, homecoming, digital sleuthing and obsession are interlaced with those derived from ancient texts and philosophy. We meet a group of writers lounging on the edge of an earthquake disaster zone; a Mandarin ostracised from his old court, desperately trying to avoid a threat to his life; a woman who inexplicably loses her voice and the poet who steals her words. The collection builds towards a novella following the rise (and fall) of one of Confucius' disciples.

MERKING [The Mark] Fríða Ísberg

Should an individual fail the test, an arsenal of treatment resources will be offered to them. The test is administered to the public free of charge. Individuals who have been tested may subsequently volunteer to 'be marked,' that is, to have their results published in the Icelandic Psychological Association's public registry. Civil servants and politicians are being marked. An increasing number of corporations are getting empathy certified. And new residential communities prohibit entry to unmarked individuals.

Iceland has divided into two camps: those who want a safer society, and those who want a just one. In less than two months, a national referendum will determine whether compulsory marking will become a reality—whether all individuals will be required to undergo testing and be marked.

I Do Not Bid Farewell begins with the dream sequence of the novelist Kyung Ha. In a snowy field, thousands of black logs are planted like tombstones. She wonders why a graveyard was built in such a place, whether the bones under the grave have already been swept away by the sea, and whether the bones that remain on the upper ground should be moved, but there is no one around and no shovel in sight. Running through the fields in despair, she wakes up. She assumes that the dream is related to the Gwangju Massacre which she wrote about in her previous novel. She goes to Jeju Island to take care of her mother and spends time with her friend Inseon.

One day, she gets a call from Inseon who has had her finger amputated in an accident and is in a Seoul hospital. She begs Kyungha to go to the island to rescue his bird who has not eaten for three days and is alone in a secluded house in the mountainous region of Jeju. Suffering from a terrible headache, Kyung-ha manages to get on the last bus and head to In-seon's the village. However, on the way up the mountain she gets lost in heavy snow and darkness. When she finally arrives, she is confronted by Inseon's family history and in particular her mother who spent decades trying to find her brother who went missing in the wake of the 1948 massacre.

I Do Not Bid Farewell is a journey from death to life, a novel about resilience and pain, about a determination to hold on and acknowledge that neither love nor mourning will end.

Han Kang was born in Gwangju, South Korea, and moved to Seoul at the age of ten. She studied Korean literature at Yonsei University. Her writing has won the Yi Sang Literary Prize, the Today's Young Artist Award, and the Korean Literature Novel Award. *The Vegetarian* won the 2016 Man Booker International Prize, and *Human Acts* won the Manhae Literary Award.

WOMAN, EATING Claire Kohda

Lydia is hungry. She's always wanted to try Japanese food. Sushi, Teriyaki, blue-fin tuna – the food she has been told by her mother that her Japanese father liked to eat. And then there is ramen, and bubble tea; and iced-coffee, English tea, milk; and foraged herbs and plants, and the vegetables grown by the other young artists at the London studio space she is secretly squatting in. But, Lydia can't eat any of these things. Her body doesn't work like those of other people. The only thing she can digest is blood, and it turns out that sourcing fresh pigs' blood in London – where she is living away from her vampire mother for the first time – is much more difficult than she'd anticipated.

Then there are the humans – the other artists at the studio space, the people at the gallery she interns at, the strange men that follow her after dark, and Ben, a boyish, goofy-grinned artist she is developing feelings for. Lydia knows that they are her natural prey, but she can't bring herself to feed on them. In her windowless studio, where she paints and studies the work of other artists, watches Buffy the Vampire Slayer and videos of people eating food on YouTube and Instagram, Lydia considers her place in the world. She has many of the things humans wish for – perpetual youth, near-invulnerability, immortality – but, she is miserable; she is lonely; and she is hungry – always hungry.

Gradually, as Lydia develops as a woman and an artist, she learns that she must reconcile the conflicts within her – between her demon and human sides, her mixed ethnic heritage, and her relationship with food, and, in turn, humans – if she is to find a way to exist in the world. Before any of this, however, she must eat.

Claire Kohda is an English writer and musician. She reviews books for publications including *The Guardian, The TLS, The Observer* and *The Spectator*, specialising in books from and about East Asia. Britain shaped the modern Middle East through the lines that it drew in the sand after the First World War and through the League of Nation mandates over the fledgling states which followed. While Anthony Eden and Tony Blair are the two most prominent examples of prime ministers whose reputations have been ruined by their interventions in the region, they were not alone in taking significant risks in deploying British forces to the Middle East. Drawing these threads together, Nigel Ashton explores the reasons why British leaders have been unable to resist returning to the mire of the Middle East, while highlighting the misconceptions about the region which have helped shape their interventions, and the legacy of history which has fuelled their pride and arrogance. These were the words of philosopher Philippa Foot, who was twenty-five when images of the concentration camps appeared in British newspapers. When the first atom bomb fell on Hiroshima, the philosopher Elizabeth Anscombe, only two years older, saw that a terrifying new possibility for human action had taken shape – by signing his name at the foot of an order, Harry Truman had brought World War II to an end by killing hundreds of thousands.

Together with their friends, Iris Murdoch and Mary Midgley, these women confronted a world of horror incomparable to anything seen by the ancient philosophers they studied at Oxford. Taught by refugee scholars, conscientious objectors and women, and following fragments left by Wittgenstein, they saw that neither the great Enlightenment thinkers of the past, nor the logical innovators of the early twentieth century, nor even new Existentialist philosophy after the liberation of France, could make sense of this new human reality – nor of the kind of creatures we humans are.

Humans, like other animals, have basic needs - food and shelter, love and friendship. But as language-using creatures, we dwell not only in the present but in the past and future too. We have the ability to question, imagine and create. Who am I? What is freedom? What is real? What is human goodness? What is possible?

For these women, the answer lay in the question. We are metaphysical animals. We are animals that can write poetry and change history. But what we know is limited and the cosmos is huge. Our motives are not always good and often obscure to ourselves.

This is a story of how, from the disorder and despair of the second world war, four brilliant women found hope in the possibility of human goodness by forging a new philosophy of the human – a philosophy that is here for us today.

A huge body of research has subsequently proved Carlos Monteiro right. What's more, Ultra-Processed Food, or UPF, is not just the main driver of obesity, but also causes metabolic disease, depression, inflammation, anxiety, and cancer. The mass production of UPF is responsible for devastating environmental damage. Through contributing to synergistic pandemics of undernutrition, obesity and climate change, UPF is one of the main existential threats to humankind.

Yet, in the period since 2009, UPF consumption has grown such that in the US and UK adults absorb around 60% of their calories from UPF, adolescents absorb around 70%, and infants 80-100%. UPF is not mentioned in the national nutritional guidance either in the US or the UK; there is no package labelling to indicate UPF or the immense harm it causes. It is ubiquitous, and it is ruthlessly marketed, sometimes even as health food.

Ultra-Processed People is about the science and economics of UPF, aiming to reframe obesity as a commerciogenic disease, driven by unregulated industry and caused by the consumption of knowingly harmful, addictive substances, in much the same way that lung cancer is caused by tobacco. It is not a diet book, but will lead to weight loss; it is not an environmental treatise, but will help the planet. It will use evidence to propose solutions, both for policy makers and for readers. Threaded through it is a highly engaging personal account of the author's own confused relationship with UPF, as a doctor, parent, sibling and broadcaster.
