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

Retired policeman Tom Kettle is enjoying the quiet of his new home, a lean-to annexed to a white Victorian Castle in Dalkey overlooking the sea. For months he has barely seen a soul, but his peace is interrupted when two former colleagues turn up at his door to ask questions about a decades-old case. A traumatic case which Tom never quite came to terms with.

His peace is further disturbed by a young mother and family who move in next door, a woman on the run from her own troubles. And what of Tom's family, his wife June and their two children?

Exploring memory, grief and long buried secrets, *Old God's Time* is a beautiful, haunting novel in which everything is not quite what it seems - a novel about what we live through, what we live with, and what may survive us.

A debut about the ways relationships and trauma roam our lives, and the lingering effects of abuse, *Disturbance* is a novel of emotional depth and clarity, told bracingly with interrogative and witty prose of the highest quality.

A young woman moves to a new flat, to live alone, having managed to escape her abusive partner. Over the course of a summer she begins to feel the boundaries of her reality shift in and out of focus, as this ex-boyfriend makes his presence felt in ways both psychological and paranormal. During these days of seeming hopelessness the woman begins an unlikely friendship with her next-door neighbour, Chelsea. Together they start to explore and play with nascent supernatural powers and the occult, seeking to remove unhappiness from their lives and replace it with agency.

As the narrator is drawn further into this circle, she sees parallels between her neighbour's boyfriend and her own abusive partner and decides she must take on the responsibility of extracting Chelsea from the relationship before it's too late, to place a hex on him, in so doing rid herself of the disturbances that haunt her.



The Package is a novel about family relations, about ties which – we assume – are inescapable. The female narrator has left her homeland and has exercised her detachment as if it were a muscle that needs to be trained in order to have a life that offers some pleasures. Her plans do not foresee that the thread that connects the narrator back to her origins may suddenly materialise to put in disarray the small made-to-measure world she has built for herself.

Where does a family begin and end? Where in the continuous chain is the starting point? Throughout the novel the concept of filiation is challenged as well as the idea of being part of. The story does not arrive at any conclusion; the ending, rather, leaves us on the edge of a deep crack into which the very few certainties we may have, drop. However, this is a novel that also gives us the excitement of recognising that we are finally at the beginning of a story that is completely new and completely ours.

Sonia Nasir is a thirty-nine year old actress, living in London, who has suffered a personal and professional crisis. In the summer of 2017 she returns to Haifa, her father's hometown, to stay with her older sister Haneen. Feeling lost and disillusioned, Sonia hopes that through this first trip back in fifteen years she will not only have a break from her normal life but will re-establish connections with both her sister and her past self.

She finds herself drawn into the orbit of Mariam Mansour, a charismatic theatre director who is putting on a production of Hamlet in the West Bank. Sonia is persuaded to play Gertrude; Hamlet will be played by Wael Hejazi, a dazzling young pop-star from a refugee camp near Ramallah. Mariam's grand visions for artistic resistance to Israeli oppression and for Palestinian cultural unity in the face of fragmentation lead her not only to involve elements from all over Palestinian society to her production, but also, dangerously, her brother Salim, a politician in the Israeli parliament, whose contribution to the funding process leads rapidly to his suspension and draws the attention of the Israeli state to the project, with dramatic results.

Enter Ghost is a book about culture, oppression, identity and freedom; a love letter to Palestine and to art as a form of resistance and unity.

Isabella Hammad was born in London. She was awarded the 2018 Plimpton Prize for Fiction and a 2019 O Henry Prize. Her first novel *The Parisian* (2019) won a Palestine Book Award, the Sue Kaufman Prize from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, a Betty Trask Award from the Society of Authors in the UK. She was a National Book Foundation 5 Under 35 Honoree, and has received literary fellowships from MacDowell and the Lannan Foundation. *Enter Ghost* is her second novel.

We Do Not Part begins with the dream sequence of the novelist Kyung Ha. In a snowy field, thousands of black logs are planted like tombstones. Running through the fields in despair, she wakes up. She assumes that the dream is related to the Gwangiu Massacre which she wrote about in her previous novel. She goes to Jeju Island to take care of her mother and spends time with her friend Inseon.

One day, she gets a call from Inseon who has had her finger amputated in an accident and is in a Seoul hospital. She begs Kyungha to go to the island to rescue his bird who has not eaten for three days and is alone in a secluded house in the mountainous region of Jeju. When she finally arrives, she is confronted by Inseon's family history and in particular her mother who spent decades trying to find her brother who went missing in the wake of the 1948 massacre.

We Do Not Part is a journey from death to life, a novel about resilience and pain, about a determination to hold on and acknowledge that neither love nor mourning will end.



Lydia is hungry. She's always wanted to try sashimi, ramen, onigiri with sour plum stuffed inside – the food her Japanese father liked to eat. And then there is bubble tea and the vegetables grown by the other young artists at the London studio space she is secretly squatting in. But Lydia can't eat any of this. The only thing she can digest is blood, and it turns out that sourcing fresh pigs' blood in London – where she is living away from her vampire mother for the first time – is much more difficult than she'd anticipated.

Then there are the humans: the people at the gallery she interns at, the strange men who follow her after dark, and Ben, a goofy-grinned artist she is developing feelings for. Lydia knows that they are her natural prey, but she can't bring herself to feed on them.

If Lydia is to find a way to exist in the world, she must reconcile the conflicts within her – between her demon and human sides, her mixed ethnic heritage, and her relationship with food, and, in turn, humans. Before any of this, however, she must eat.



When the world is still counting the cost of the Second World War and the Iron Curtain has closed, eleven-year-old Roland Baines's life is turned upside down. 2,000 miles from his mother's protective love, stranded at an unusual boarding school, his vulnerability attracts piano teacher Miss Miriam Cornell, leaving scars as well as a memory of love that will never fade.

Now, when his wife vanishes, leaving him alone with his tiny son, Roland is forced to confront the reality of his restless existence. As the radiation from Chernobyl spreads across Europe, he begins a search for answers that looks deep into his family history and will last for the rest of his life.

From the Suez Crisis to the Cuban Missile Crisis, the fall of the Berlin Wall to the current pandemic and climate change, Roland sometimes rides with the tide of history, but more often struggles against it. Haunted by lost opportunities, he seeks solace through every possible means - music, literature, friends, sex, politics and, finally, love cut tragically short, then love ultimately redeemed. His journey raises important questions for us all. Can we take full charge of the course of our lives without damage to others? How do global events beyond our control shape our lives and our memories? And what can we really learn from the traumas of the past?

Ian McEwan is the critically acclaimed author of seventeen novels and two short story collections. His novels include *The Child in Time*, which won the 1987 Whitbread Novel of the Year Award, *Amsterdam*, which won the 1998 Booker Prize, *Nutshell* and *Machines Like Me*, which was a number-one bestseller.



The Witching Tide is the first work from a major new voice in fiction, taking real life historical events - the witch hunts of 17th Century England - and with remarkable prose recounts the horrors of the past to ask questions we face in the present - the precarious position of women, the violence of men and how we give a voice to the voiceless.

East Anglia, England 1645. A mute midwife, Martha Hallybread, has lived more than four decades peacefully in the village of Cleftwater. Suddenly, amidst the background of the English Civil War she becomes a silent witness to a witch hunt organised by a new arrival, the sinister witch-finder Silas Makepeace. Makepeace has been travelling up the coast and the quiet village of Cleftwater is now in his sights. Once there, tensions mount quickly as more and more local women are thrown into gaol accused of witchcraft.

The novel puts the moral dilemma of Martha centre stage, as she is co-opted into searching village women and friends' bodies for evidence of 'Devil marks'. Fearing for herself and those she loves, Martha revives a poppet – a wax witching doll – that she has inherited from her mother, in the hope that this will bring protection to herself and those accused. But the poppet's true powers are unknowable: is it not only a force for good but also a reckoning of evil too? Barely two weeks will change the fortunes of everyone in Cleftwater forever.

Margaret Meyer has an MA in Prose Fiction from UEA and was the recipient of an Escalator Development mentoring award as well as two Arts Council England artists grants. Meyer grew up in New Zealand where she worked as a journalist and fiction editor. In the UK she was the Museum of London's Publishing Director before becoming Director of Literature with the British Council. She lives in Norwich.

Limpia is a literary exploration of the complex set of emotions involved in domestic work relationships.

The novel begins with an inescapable fact: a girl has died. From there it explores, in a fictional first-person account, the daily routine of a woman, Estela, and shows how her apparently simple life turns into a repetitive and ultimately violent nightmare. Constructed in a circular way (the novel starts at the point where it ends), *Limpia* allows us to enter the intimacy of a home, the power relations that are established there and shows us how invisible and neglected this woman subjected to the "live in maid" regime is.

In the tradition of "dirty realism", she talks about the family she looked after, the mother she left behind in the countryside, the loneliness so deep that her closest relationship is with a stray dog who comes to the house regularly. Her emotional detachment coupled with her anger and her exhaustion propel us forward to the heart of the novel, what happened to the child. Reminiscent of Jean Genet's *The Maids* and of Alfonso Cuarón's film Roma, *Limpia* is an astonishing, electrifying novel.

They operated beyond normal human constraint and indeed often claimed a superhuman or divine authority. In practice they ran the gamut from being some of the most remarkable men who ever lived, to being some of the worst and least remarkable.

In the Shadow of the Gods is the first book to grapple seriously with this extraordinary phenomenon. Across the world peoples, willingly or unwillingly, fell into orbit around figures who reshaped or destroyed entire societies, imposed religions and invaded rivals. Lieven describes the anatomy of imperial monarchy and the principles by which it functioned. He compares the great emperors of antiquity, the caliphs and the warrior-emperors of the steppe before he turns to the Habsburg, Russian, Ottoman, Mughal and Chinese emperors, packing the book with extraordinary stories, astute observations and a sense of both delight and horror at these individuals' antics.

As one of the great experts both on empires and on Russian history, Lieven is brilliantly qualified to write a book that brings to life a system of rule that dominated most of human history, as well as some of history's grandest and most dismaying figures.

Dominic Lieven is a Senior Research Fellow of Trinity College, Cambridge University, and a Fellow of the British Academy. His book Russia Against Napoleon won the Wolfson Prize for History and the Prize of the Fondation Napoleon for the best foreign work on the Napoleonic era.







Telling the story of the judgement that brought an end to Britain's colonial rule in Africa, *The Last Colony* is a riveting, enraging and beautifully rendered history of international law by the bestselling author of *East West Street*.

The close of the Second World War heralded an age of human rights and self-determination. Yet in the 1960s, Britain's colonial instinct ignited once more: a secret decision was taken to offer the US a base at one of the Chagos islands in the Indian Ocean, to create a new colony and deport the entire local population. One of those inhabitants was Liseby Elysé, twenty years old, newly married, expecting her first child. One suitcase, no pets, the British ordered, expelling her from the only home she had ever known.

In 2018 Chagos and colonialism finally reached the World Court in The Hague. Would it rule that Britain illegally detached Chagos from Mauritius? Would they open the door to Chagossians returning home - or exile them forever? Philippe Sands is Professor of Law at UCL and a practising barrister. He has been involved in many important international cases, including Pinochet, Congo, Yugoslavia, Rwanda, Iraq, Guantanamo and the Rohingya. He is the author of East West Street, which won the Baillie Gifford Prize for Non-fiction, and Sunday Times bestselling The Ratline. He is President of English PEN and a member of the board of the Hay Festival.



In 2009 a Brazilian scientist proposed that the global obesity pandemic might have a single cause: the consumption of something he called Ultra-Processed Food - edible substances made with synthetic ingredients using techniques not recognisable in a domestic kitchen. A huge body of research has subsequently proved Carlos Monteiro right. What's more, Ultra-Processed Food, or UPF, is not just the main driver of obesity, but also causes metabolic disease, depression, inflammation, anxiety, and cancer. The mass production of UPF is responsible for devastating environmental damage. Through contributing to synergistic pandemics of undernutrition, obesity and climate change, UPF is one of the main existential threats to humankind

Yet, in the period since 2009, UPF consumption has grown such that in the US and UK adults absorb around 60% of their calories from UPF, adolescents absorb around 70%, and infants 80-100%. UPF is not mentioned in the national nutritional guidance either in the US or the UK; there is no package labelling to indicate UPF or the immense harm it causes. It is ubiquitous, and it is ruthlessly marketed, sometimes even as health food.

Ultra-Processed People is about the science and economics of UPF, aiming to reframe obesity as a commerciogenic disease, driven by unregulated industry and caused by the consumption of knowingly harmful, addictive substances, in much the same way that lung cancer is caused by tobacco. It is not a diet book, but will lead to weight loss; it is not an environmental treatise, but will help the planet. It will use evidence to propose solutions, both for policy makers and for readers. Threaded through it is a highly engaging personal account of the author's own confused relationship with UPF, as a doctor, parent, sibling and broadcaster.

Dr Chris van Tulleken is an associate professor at UCL and a practising infectious diseases doctor in the NHS. He has a PhD in molecular virology and his academic work now focuses on research integrity in infant nutrition. He has written and presented dozens of BBC flagship science and medicine programmes, including BAFTA-nominated 'The Doctor Who Gave Up Drugs'. Together with his twin brother Xand, he has presented Operation Ouch! on CBBC, which has won two BAFTAs and been nominated for five more.
