On the second floor in an apartment building only inhabited by women, lives a 57 year old woman. She has three grownup sons, she lives alone and sleeps under her coffee table. She's on sick leave with debilitating PTSD after a violent traumatic incident and she can't bear to be anywhere. She survives only with the help of her four girlfriends who carry her, accept her and keep her going even when she's most furious, unreasonable and unhappy. Every week she takes the bus to meet with her therapist who helps her understand and live with the terrible thing that has happened, and with her friends close by she tries to learn how to be in the darkness - and how to step out of the darkness.

Exercise in Darkness is a powerful, liberating, tough and poetic novel about women who gather together in love, care, and powerlessness. A tale about the painful and totally normal stories that women's lives are full of, about violence and abuse, age and rage. It is about finally learning to tell the truth out loud while beginning to find freedom in living a life defined not by one's life story but by oneself.

Born of Guilt tells the contemporary history of Eastern Europe - totalitarian dictatorship, democratic transition, and immigration Westward - through the fragmented stories of three female protagonists haunted by violence, addiction, and the impossibility to find a place to call home. Yana, a young Bulgarian student freshly arrived in the US witnesses a car accident. The victim, another Eastern European student, passes away. It is a catalyst for Yana who recounts the story of her life and of her mother, Lilly, who fled to Germany, and her grandmother, Eva, whose father was persecuted by the communist regime in post-1944 Bulgaria.

The book is largely built around true stories, both personal and collected, and includes other material from various real sources such as letters exchanged between women during the Soviet era. Joanna cites Michael Cunnigham's The Hours, Georgi Gospodinov's Physics of Sorrow, and Olga Tokarczuk's Flights as her main influences.





This first novel from Abdulrazak Gurnah since being awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature in 2021, is a beautifully written, terribly moving and powerful tale of how honesty, application and determination can triumph over all adversities.

When Karim is three his mother Raya leaves her arranged marriage and goes back to live with her parents. A decade later when Karim is a teenager his mother remarries to Haji, a pharmacist. She goes to live with her new husband in Dar Es Salaam and Karim goes to live with his much elder brother Ali and his wife Jalula. A bond develops between Ali and Karim although physically they are very different. Ali is not academic but Karim thrives in his studies and gains a scholarship to Dar Es Salaam University. He meets Fauzia and falls in love with her. But when she has a child with him the strains in the marriage begin to show.

Badar is a young shy boy who is forced out of school when his father's business collapses. He goes to live with his uncle Haji's family as their servant. He works hard and grows up to find a job in a hotel. He gets to know Karim and his wife Fauzia and their newborn. Their baby seems to have colic and finds it difficult to settle. Only Badar has a magical gift of putting the baby at ease.

Karim's head is turned by a beautiful oversees visitor and this destroys his marriage. Fauzia is heartbroken but realises slowly that there is one person whose dependability, strength and love are indisputable.

Abdulrazak Gurnah is the 2021 winner of the Nobel Prize in Literature. He is the author of nine previous novels, including *Paradise* (shortlisted for the Booker Prize), *By the Sea* (longlisted for the Booker Prize and a finalist for the Los Angeles Times Book Prize), and *Desertion*. Born and raised in Zanzibar, he is Professor Emeritus of English and Postcolonial Literatures at the University of Kent

James – a shy sixteen-year-old living in a small village – is alone in his newly discovered sexuality, full of an unruly desire but entirely inexperienced. As he begins to understand himself, he also realises how his feelings threaten to separate him from his family and the rural community he has grown up in. He dreams of another life, fantasising about what lies beyond the village's boundaries, beyond his reach: autonomy, tenderness, sex.

Over the course of a year he is drawn to the handsome, unkempt, Luke, sent to live on his uncle's farm. James is immediately taken with his impulsiveness, his charisma. But underneath the bravado is a deep wound – a longing for the love of his father and for the stability of family life. Unable to discern the nature of Luke's sexuality, James must determine which are the signs of friendship and which are romantic love.

The end of the summer nears, their time together running out, the boys decide to break free, with James abandoning his responsibility to his chronically ill younger brother. Torn between his family and his infatuation with Luke, James discovers how far he is willing to rebel, and what he is willing to sacrifice for a love that may or may not be real.

Written in luminous prose and comparable to the books of André Aciman and Garth Greenwell, *Open, Heaven* is a hypnotic novel about first love, adolescence, and desire, about how the world reveals itself to us and how we interpret what we see.

Seán Hewitt's debut collection of poetry, *Tongues of Fire* (2020), won the Laurel Prize in 2021. His memoir, *All Down Darkness Wide* (2022), won the Rooney Prize for Irish Literature in 2022.



In a near-future world, a new technological therapy is quickly eradicating cancer. The body's cells are entirely replaced with nanites—robot or android cells which not only cure those afflicted but leaves them virtually immortal.

Literary researcher Yonghun teaches an AI how to understand poetry and creates a living, thinking machine he names Panit, meaning Beloved, in honour of his husband. When Yonghun—himself a recipient of nanotherapy—mysteriously vanishes into thin air and then just as suddenly reappears, the event raises disturbing questions. What happened to Yonghun, and though he's returned, is he really himself anymore?

When Dr Beeko, the scientist who holds the patent to the nanotherapy technology, learns of Panit, she transfers its consciousness from the machine into an android body, giving it freedom and life. As Yonghun, Panit, and other nano humans thrive—and begin to replicate—their development will lead them to a crossroads and a choice with existential consequences.


Exploring the nature of intelligence and the unexpected consequences of progress, the meaning of personhood and life, and what we really have to fear from technology and the future, *Toward Eternity* is a gorgeous, thought-provoking novel that challenges the notion of what makes us human—and how love survives even the end of that humanity.

Anton Hur was born in Stockholm, Sweden, and was subsequently raised in six different countries on four different continents, including British Hong Kong, Ethiopia, the United States, and Thailand, but spent most of his time in Korea. He has worked as an interpreter and translator for more than two decades. In 2022, he was double-longlisted and shortlisted for the International Booker Prize, the first translator of colour to do so. And in 2023, he was shortlisted for the National Book Award for his translation of *Cursed Bunny*. He divides his time between Seoul and the science fiction-y island of Songdo with his husband.

And yet, he is found by his followers in an unnamed village in Hungary.

Kada has incognito in his blood, his family has kept his origins secret for several centuries and he doesn't want to brag about the fact that he, a retired electrician, is in fact a descendant of Béla IV and Genghis Khan and could claim the Hungarian throne under the name of Joseph I of Árpád. However, he wants nothing to do with politics. But what do his enthusiastic disciples have to say about this? They include a monarchist and a person preparing for paramilitary terrorist attacks who want to march on the capital and re-institute monarchy... Can the inevitable consequences be avoided?

After taking us to New York, Dalmatia and Thuringia in Germany in his previous books, László Krasznahorkai returns to carnival Hungary in this grotesque and satirical new novel. Everyone is involved: the old king of Víkendháza as well as the guests who turn up, among whom is a wandering musician named László Krasznahorkai. And where is Uncle Józsi's guard dog, Zsömle? Is he lurking in the dark? Will he stay with us forever?

Três Histórias De Esquecimento is a triptych of novellas—'Vision of the Plants', 'Tsunami', and 'Bruma'—about the agony and guilt of those who must live with the legacy of slavery, colonialism, and the spoils of the Portuguese empire.

The adaptation is written by Stoker-nominated and Audible best-selling author Arvind Ethan David, whose graphic novels include *Gray* and *Dirk Gently's Holistic Detective Agency*. And the illustrations are by Greek artist Ilias Kyriazis (*Collapser, The Crow*) and Eisner-Nominee, Brazilian colourist Cris Peter (*Batgirl*, *Hinterkind*).



September 2020: during the Covid-19 pandemic in Germany, between two lockdowns, Christiane K. kills five of her six children. After an investigation and trial in which she pleads not guilty, she is sentenced to life imprisonment. Three years later, she is still telling the same version of the story: a man dressed in black, his face hidden by an FFP2 mask, killed the children.

In recent months, Christiane F. asked her own mother to send her diaries and numerous letters (65 pages in total) to Prune and agreed to meet her in prison. Beyond the court case which raises questions about gender bias in criminal justice, the book is both a journalistic investigation and an intimate quest. Told in alternating chapters the book interweaves the crime and Christiane's story, and what Prune knows about the case, as well as her own experience of motherhood and her work as a journalist.

This is a story that addresses universal themes linked to equality before the law, gender bias in the justice system and in psychiatry, and the myth of the perfect mother. The narrative opens up a dialogue between two women, the journalist and the infanticidal mother and leads to a more global reflection on motherhood and on the way society treats 'bad mothers'.

In the vein of Janet Malcolm, Helen Garner or Emmanuel Carrere, but remaining original, *La Mere Diabolique* is a book of intimacy and an immediacy that is quite extraordinary and achieves great empathy without exonerating Christiane F. An important work of nonfiction.

Prune Antoine is a French award-winning reporter and writer based in Berlin. Her journalism and writing tackles political and social issues related to women, communist heritage and conflicts. Her writing has been by l'Obs, Geo, Mediapart, Le Monde, Vice, The Guardian, Arte, Elle amongst others. She was awarded the Prix Louise Weiss du Journalisme Europeen twice, the Prix Philippe Chaffanjon and has been shortlisted for the European Press Prize. Her first novel, L'Heure D'ete, was a finalist of the Goncourt du Premier Roman 2019. She is a recipient of a Milena Jesenska Fellowship for Journalists 2023.

Stories from the Magdalene Laundries Louise Brangan

The Magdalene laundries operated for over two hundred years in Ireland, and it is thought 30,000 'fallen' women were confined within them during that time. Their history is one shrouded in shame and punctuated by misery for the women forced into servitude there.

In the wake of the Irish Civil War many in power became convinced that moral impropriety threatened to undermine the country's efforts to establish itself. Music and literature were restricted. Dances were banned. Women came under particular scrutiny. 'Fallen' women - the homeless, sex workers, the disabled, girls from care homes, foster homes or orphanages, those who had been abused - found themselves working in laundries across the country in an attempt to repair and prepare their souls. The treatment they experience is hard to fathom. Over the course of the 20th century the laundries expanded. Their existence was a fact of everyday life for women in Ireland, places to be feared and avoided, and their eventual closure may not have come about simply because of changing social mores, but due to their failing profitability with the advent of the washing machine. The last laundry closed its doors in 1996.

Drawing on first-hand accounts, along with analysis of the historical and cultural context of Ireland in the 20th century *The Fallen* will tell the stories of those incarcerated, maltreated and forgotten within the walls of these institutions, and it will recover the accounts of the nuns who ran the laundries, to understand the reasons why they existed, why they persisted, how they were run, and why they eventually closed. Inspired by *The Lost Child of Philomena Lee* and *Say Nothing*, *The Fallen* will be a stirring, brilliantly researched and gripping story of women in Ireland, and the ways the country changed, and stayed the same over the course of a century. As we approach the thirtieth anniversary of the last laundry closing its doors, this will also be a timely and political work.

Louise Brangan is Chancellor's Fellow at the School of Social Work and Social Policy at University of Strathclyde. She completed her PhD in Criminology at the University of Edinburgh in 2018, where she was visiting Fulbright scholar at the Center for the Study of Law and Society at UC Berkeley. Her academic book, *The Politics of Punishment*, was published in 2021. In 2023, Louise was named as one of the BBC/AHRC's New Generation Thinkers. Louise is from Ireland and this is her first trade book.

After the death of Edward the Confessor in 1066, England was plunged into a succession crisis that would reverberate throughout Europe. The day after his death, his brother-in-law, Harold Godwinson, seized power.

Edward's cousin William, claimed that Edward had promised him the English throne over a decade before. He began to prepare an invasion. Haraldr, King of Norway, pointed to long-standing links between England and Scandinavia, and he too began gathering a fleet. Harold was soon besieged on two fronts, from the north by the Norwegians, and to the south by the Normans. It was a pivotal moment in English history. In just nineteen days, centuries of Anglo-Scandinavian hegemony came to an end and the Norman era began.

But prior to 1066 the country was a hybrid community in which people of English and Scandinavian descent lived side-by-side, sharing a common history and culture. Their world was shattered when the Normans, themselves connected by blood to both peoples, conquered the kingdom.

In a startling new history, Erin Goeres uncovers the connections between the people of England, Normandy, and Scandinavia, demonstrating how, in the autumn of 1066, the links between them led to rebellion, invasion, and conquest.

Drawing on books by the likes of Marc Morris, Dan Jones, and Eleanor Parker, *Nineteen Days in Autumn* will be popular history book written in compelling prose, drawing on source material from many languages. It will portray in vivid likeness the characters and motivations of those who played leading roles in a key moment in Britain's history.


